DEFINITIONS OF SOCIOLOGICAL THEORY

R.K.Merton: Sociological theory refers to logically inter-connected sets of propositions from which empirical uniformities can be derived.

Talcott Parsons: Sociological theory is a theoretical system in the present sense is a body of logically interdependent generalized concepts of empirical reference.

FUNCTIONS OF THEORIES

- 1. Theory suggests potential problems and produces new investigative studies;
- 2. Theory predicts facts;
- 3. Theory systematizes matter and their relationships into convenient conceptual schema;
- 4. Theory establishes a linkage between specific empirical findings and general sociological orientations;
- 5. Theory guides research and narrows the range of facts to be studied;
- 6. Theory serve as tools of inquiry;
- 7. Theory points to gaps in our knowledge;

CHARECTERISTICS OF SOCIOLOGICAL THEORY

- 1. A theory is couched in terms of well defined concepts and logically inter-connected propositions.
- 2. A theory is a systematized symbolic construction and does not share the ineluctability of fact .
- 3. A theory is provisional in character, it is always open to revision depending on new insights and evidences.
- 4. It is verifiable in a preliminary way ,that is , consistent with the body of known facts and available evidence.

TYPES OF THEORIS

G.C Homans(1964): Homans identifies two type of general theory; 1) The normative theory 2) The non-normative theory The normative theory theories fall into two categoriesa) one side b) two or many sided

H. Wagner: Classifies sociological theory into three main categories: 1) Positive sociological theory 2) Interpretative Sociologies 3) Non-scientific or evaluative social change

Sociological theories are mainly divided into three categories:

a) Speculative vs. Grounded Theoriesb) Grand Theory vs. Miniature Theoryc) Macro vs. Micro Theory
